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WINSFA

The Winnipeg Science Fiction and Fantasy Association (WINSFA) Senate is the Board of Directors for Keycon, which provides assistance to the Co-chairs, administers the Equity fund for KeyCon, and chooses the Co-Chairs and Treasurer for KeyCon. All the members of the WINSFA Senate have had either a long-term commitment to fandom in Winnipeg, or experience in the running of KeyCon or other fan-run conventions. The Senate meets at least once per month. We believe this provides a continuity and stability for the convention, allowing it to continue for now 25 years where many other conventions in recent years have either foundered or shut down completely.

WINSFA Senate Elections

Each year the WINSFA Senate holds its Annual General Meeting at Keycon, open to all convention registrants, and at this AGM we hold an "Election from the Floor". By doing this we offer an opportunity for two convention members to be elected to the Senate for a 1 year term, so they may have an opportunity to participate in Senate meetings, put forth their ideas and have a hand in the 'backstage' processes that contribute to Keycon and other fandom activities. At the end of their term they are given an opportunity to report back to the convention attendance about their experience and thoughts about the Senate and its work.

All KeyCon members are encouraged to attend the AGM, participate in the election (nominate, vote) and to encourage their friends to attend as well. Please check your program book and come out to lend your voice to the process.

In this aspect, as in all other regards to running KeyCon, volunteers are a vital commodity.

The WINSFA Senate is seeking people interested in running for the position of Con Chairs for Keycon 2010. Available on request is a copy of the Constitution, which gives details on the obligations and responsibilities of running Keycon. Please be aware that the Senate would require from you a letter with the names of the two prospective Co-chairs, as well as their signatures and current contact information for each candidate. This must be received by an active member of the WINSFA Senate or by either of the current (2008) Con-Chairs by the end of closing ceremonies.


Weapons and Accessories Policy

Keycon has always welcomed and encouraged costumes; both for the Masquerade and for general display during the 'con. Hall costumes, panel pieces, LARP costumes; they all had a vibrant atmosphere to the convention. The more the merrier, and the fewer the sadder we'd be.

Many of the best costumes require accessories. Including, but not limited to, weapons appropriate to the costume. What mighty wizard would be caught dead out in public without his staff? An elfin ranger would be naked without his bow, and hey, just TRY to take the sword from a true barbarian! I'm sure you'd have to pry the blaster carbine out of a stormtrooper's dead fingers.

So...by all means, accessorize! But we do add a word of caution: please use care, caution, and forethought. Drawing a blade and waving it around in a crowded hallway is irresponsible, dangerous, and, well, stupid. Carrying a modern firearm replica is likely to get you reported and possibly arrested. Being at Keycon does not grant you leave to break laws, so if you need a firearm accessory, please check the applicable laws.

Use caution! You are responsible for your accessory. Watch where your bow or staff is pointing, let's keep the ankle bruising and noggin knockin' to a bare minimum. Keep your blades sheathed, scabbarded, etc. Securing

Alcohol and Smoking Policy

Keycon's Hospitality suites are all well informed about the rules concerning mixing alcohol and minors. The rule is: alcohol mixes, minors don't. The suites will be carefully checking badges and ID's. If any minor is found partaking an alcoholic beverage, that Hospitality suite will be shut down immediately, for the duration of the convention. Please, if you are a minor and need to imbibe, don't break the law at Keycon or it will have consequences reaching to many others beside yourself.

Smoking under Winnipeg Health laws smoking is only permitted in smoking room and in outdoor areas. Please remember to time your smoking breaks accordingly to allow for travel time especially at peak times and do not take frustration out on other congers because you have not had your nicotine fix.

Appropriate Dress

Here follows an excerpt from the hotel's letter about Dress Code for the our stay at the hotel.

CANvention28

Welcome to the 28th Edition of CANvention, this is the second time the Aurora Awards have been held at KeyCon.

Founded in 1980. CANvention is the convention of the Canadian Science Fiction & Fantasy Association / Association canadienne de la science-fiction et du fantastique (CSFFA) where the Aurora Awards are Auroras presented. The honour the achievements in Canadian Science Fiction and Fantasy from the past year. Each year a different Canadian Science Fiction convention or group has hosted the awards.

History and Background of Aurora Awards

The Canadian Science Fiction and Fantasy Awards ("the Auroras") have been presented annually since 1980 with only the exception is 1984. The name Aurora has been officially in use since 1991. The current trophy design, created Frank Johnson of Alberta was accepted as the recommended trophy design at the 1992 business meeting. It is made of three upright aluminium pieces on a wood base.

On a per-capita basis, the Aurora Awards have the largest voter turnout of any national SF award in the world, exceeding that of the American-dominated Hugos, the Japanese Seiuns, the British Arthur C. Clarke Awards, and the Australian Ditmars.

The Auroras are closest to the style of the Hugos in the method that they are selected. First, there is a nomination phase to select a short list, then a voting phase to pick the winner from that short list. The Australian voting method is used for the voting phase. This method has the voters rank their choices in each category. Voting this way makes it difficult for anyone to "buy" an award.

Since 1991, awards have been presented in 10 categories. There are 6 professional awards (3 English and 3 French), 3 fan awards, and the artistic achievement award (open to both pros & fans). At the beginning, in 1980, there was only one award.

The Canadian Science Fiction and Fantasy Association, an unincorporated literary society, consequently the awards are financed by voting fees. by donations and by the host convention. There is no permanent funding-it is on a year to year basis.

Voting For the Auroras

All KeyCOn25 members, who are Canadian residents, are also members of CANvention28. An Aurora Awards ballot is included in you registration package and a ballot box will be located near the registration desk. On site voting ends at 6 pm CST on Saturday May 17th, 2008.

Voting booth is available in the dealers room on Saturday for membership to vote.

The CSFFA's annual business meeting will discuss organization issues, consider proposals for change and decide the site of the next year's CANvention. The meeting will be held at 10 am on Monday Morning in the Crocus Room on the 12th floor of the hotel.

Eric Flint



Eric Flint's writing career began with the novel *Mother of Demons*, which was selected by *Science Fiction Chronicle* as one of the best novels of 1997. With David Drake, he has collaborated on the six novels in the Belisarius series (*An Oblique Approach, In the Heart of Darkness, Destiny's Shield, Fortune's Stroke, The Tide of Victory* and *The Dance of Time*), as well as a novel entitled *The Tyrant*. His alternate history novel *1632* was published in 2000, followed by many sequels, several of which made the New York Times extended bestselling list.

Flint has also co-authored SF adventure novels with the South African writer Dave Freer: Rats, Bats & Vats, The Rats, the Bats, and the Ugly, and Pyramid Scheme. His comic fantasy novels The Philosophical Strangler and Forward the Mage came out in May of 2001 and March of 2002. He is also working on a major fantasy series with Mercedes Lackey and Dave Freer, the first volume of which (The Shadow of the Lion) came out in March 2002 and the second volume (This Rough Magic) appeared in December 2003.

Flint is also working on several other ongoing projects:

- —With David Weber on a series of novels set in Weber's Honor Harrington universe. The first of those, *Crown of Slaves*, appeared in September of 2003.
- —A new alternate history series taking place in Jacksonian America, the first two volume of which have already appeared: 1812: The Rivers of War and 1824: The Arkansas War.
- —Further volumes in the Joe's World series, which began with The Philosophical Strangler and Forward the Mage.
- —A new SF adventure series with Ryk Spoor, the first volume of which came out in March 2006. (*Boundary.*) Several SF adventure volumes with K.D. Wentworth, beginning with *The Course of Empire.*

In addition to his own writing, Flint is the editor of several series reissuing the works of past SF authors. These include James H. Schmitz, Keith Laumer, Christopher Anvil, Murray Leinster, Randall Garrett, Tom Godwin and Howard L. Myers. He is also the editor of the online science fiction and fantasy magazine, *Jim Baen's UNIVERSE*.

Flint graduated Phi Beta Kappa from the University of California at Los Angeles in 1968, majoring in history (with honors), and later received a masters degree in African history from the same university. Despite his academic credentials, Flint spent most of his adult life as an activist in the American trade union movement, working as a longshoreman, truck driver, auto worker, steel worker, oil worker, meatpacker, glassblower and machinist. He has lived at various times in California, Michigan, West Virginia, Alabama, Ohio, and Illinois. He lives in northwest Indiana with his wife Lucille.

Jane Yolen





Jane Yolen is an award-winning storyteller, author, poet, and playwright. A prolific writer with over 280 books to her credit, but would you expect anything less from the daughter of two writers. Her works have been translated into thirteen languages, and many have been adapted into television shows, audio books, theatrical presentations, and television movies.

Though the majority of Jane Yolen's work is for children, she has also written adult fantasy and non-fiction. However, all of her stories and poems are rooted in her sense of family and self, and much of it also owes a strong debt to folk culture – an interest which is also reflected in her story telling. Jane's versatility has led her to be called "America's Hans Christian Andersen," and "the Aesop of the twentieth century"

In 1980, when Yolen was awarded an honorary Doctor of Law degree by Our Lady of the Elms College in Chicopee, Massachusetts, the citation recognized that "throughout her writing career she has remained true to her primary source of inspiration—folk culture." Folklore is the "perfect second skin," writes Yolen. "From under its hide, we can see all the shimmering, shadowy uncertainties of the world." Folklore, she believes, is the universal human language, a language that children instinctively feel in their hearts.

Jane Yolen's books, poems, and stories have won so many awards, they cannot all be listed, but include: the Nebula Award, the Rhysling, an Asimov's Magazine Reader's Poll award, World Fantasy Award, the Caldecott Medal, a National Book Award nomination, three Mythopoeic Awards, the Golden Kite Award, the Skylark Award, Jewish Book Award, the Christopher Medal, the Association of Jewish Libraries Award, the Charlotte Award, etc. She has six "bodies of work" awards from such diverse groups as the Catholic Library Association., the Universities of Minnesota and Keene State, the Oklahoma Libraries, and the New England Science Fiction Association.

Active in many organizations, Jane Yolen has been on the Board of Directors of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators, was president of the Science Fiction Writers of America from 1986 to 1988, is on the editorial board of several magazines, and was a founding member of the Western New England Storytellers Guild, the Western

David B. Mattingly


David Burroughs Mattingly was born in Fort Collins, Colorado in 1956, the son of John W. Mattingly, the inventor of the "Water Pik". David began drawing and painting as a small child, influenced by comic books, Edgar Rice Burroughs, and a wide array of artists from Jim Steranko, to N.C. Wyeth, to Jackson Pollack. After high school, he attended the Colorado Institute of Art , Colorado State University and later transferred to Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, California. After school, he worked at Walt Disney Studios, ultimately becoming head of the matte department. He worked on "The Black Hole", "Tron", "Dick Tracy", Stephen King's "The Stand" and most recently "I, Robot" for Weta Digital in New Zealand.

While at Disney Studios, David began doing freelance art. His first published piece was the album cover for "The Commodores Greatest Hits". His first sale of art for a book cover was for "A Wizard in Bedlam," by Christopher Stasheff, published by DAW Books. In 1983 he moved to New York City, and a year later across the Hudson River to Hoboken, New Jersey.

David has produced over 500 covers for most major publishers of science fiction and fantasy, including Baen, Bantam, DAW, Del Rey, Dell, Marvel, Omni, Playboy, Signet, and Tor. For Scholastic Inc, David painted 54 covers for K.A. Applegate's "Animorphs" series, along with the last 5 covers for the "Everworld" series... He illustrated the popular "Honor Harrington" series for author David Weber. He painted the latest repackaging of Edgar Rice Burroughs' "Pellucidar" books for Ballantine Books. He is a two time winner of Magazine and Booksellers "Best Cover of the Year" award, and winner of the Association of Science Fiction Artists "Chesley" award. Other clients include Michael Jackson, Lucasfilm, Universal Studios, Totco Oil, Galloob Toys, R/Greenberg Associates, Click 3X and Spontaneous Combustion.

After 20 years of traditional painting, David bought a computer ten years ago and has mainly worked digitally since then, preferring the powerful new tools that working digitally offers the artist. Most of his work today combines digital painting, and elements generated in 3D programs.

David is married to Cathleen Cogswell, and they share their home with three cats, Annie, Jackson and Glinda.

Obviously, Liana is not your typical female, which becomes even more apparent when you watch her spar with Ed. Liana's comedy is not like that of traditional female comics, who are content to brand themselves with genderbased humour. Liana's comedy is with clever. cerebral rife references, but she's never afraid to wade into the muck and mire of 'guy humour' and beat Ed at his own game.
